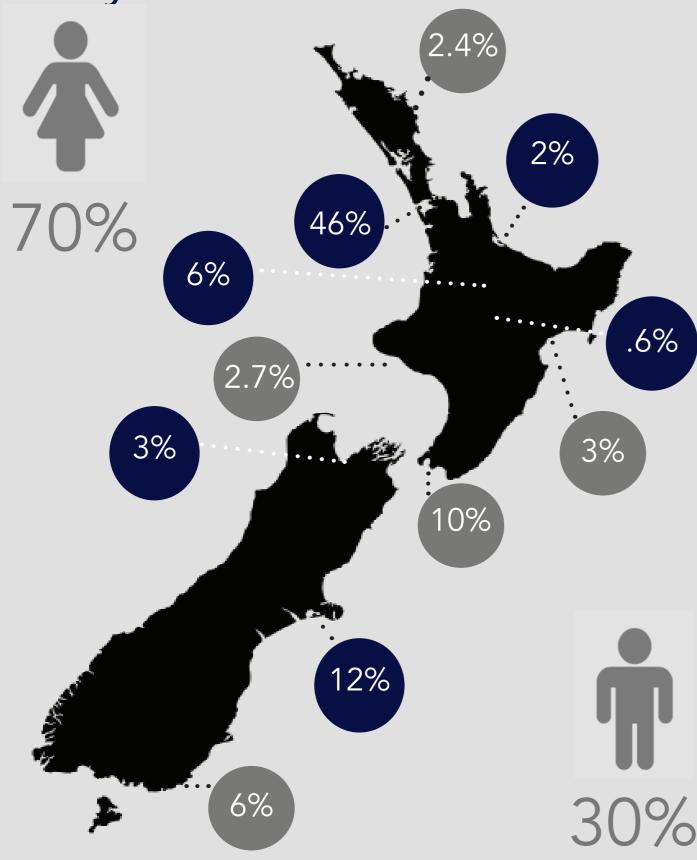

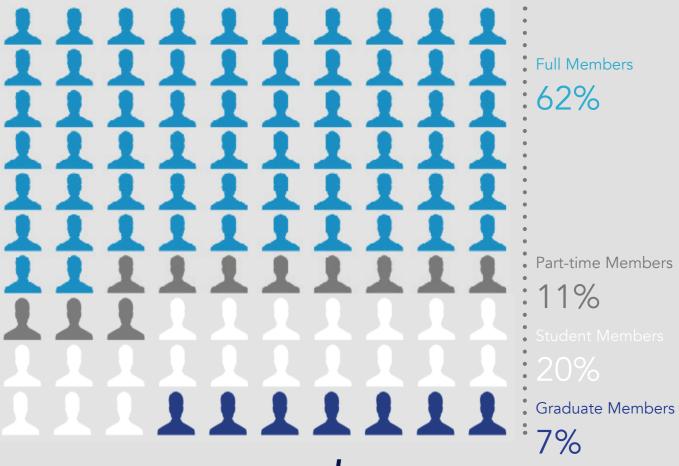

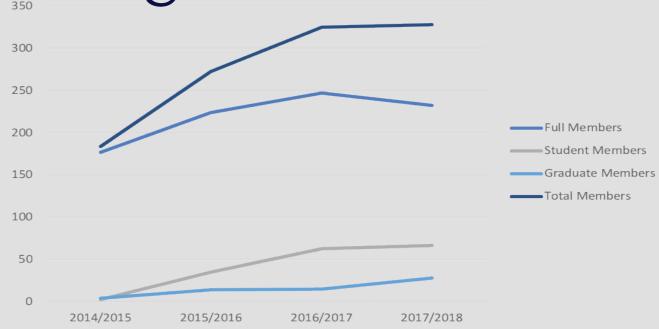

Sports Accreditation

Sport's accreditation has been developed with the aim of achieving quality outcomes for active clients through a client focused pathway. This aspirational career pathway will accredit sports podiatrists who demonstrate advanced knowledge, management and prevention of injury skills. In the past year, there have been three sports related events to further members toward accreditation.

The Fundamentals of Sports training, Practical Sports training and the Sports Masterclass at Conference - each training activity has enabled those on the pathway get a step closer to achieving accreditation. We expect the first of our members to achieve accreditation in May 2019.







Clinic Handbook

The Clinic Handbook encompasses quality frameworks, best practice standards and health and safety compliance needed to achieve clinical excellence and top of scope performance.

The Clinic Handbook is a tool that enables processes and standards to be consistently delivered to a quality standard. Built around the Allied Health Services Sector Standard NZS 8171:2005, the handbook assists podiatrists to meet the increasing need for demonstrated quality systems particularly those for funded services.

Our clinic handbook training has been delivered to over half of our membership. Some members have dipped into the content; others have started to implement a more robust quality system across clinics. One practice group embraced the quality system approach to business wholeheartedly. Through hard work and dedication, Resonance Podiatry, achieved the ultimate goal, Certification to the Allied Health Standard. Certification is provided after a comprehensive third-party auditing process by a certified auditing authority. The successful audit by the Resonance Podiatry team validates the Clinic Handbook as a worthy tool and investment by PodiatryNZ.

PodiatryNZ with BizCover provide insurance as part your membership package. The insurance included with PodiatryNZ covers medical malpractice, public, employers' and statutory liability.

Continuing education:

During any year, members have access to a range of meetings, courses and other professional development activities and every second year, a national conference is held. All training has a focus on education and knowledge and provides attendees with hours needed to meet recertification requirements. The primary function of PodiatryNZ is to provide quality educational events to advance the quality of podiatry in New Zealand.

Ministry of Health and Health Workforce New Zealand

Skills shortage

Much of the government advocacy work undertaken by PodiatryNZ is aimed at addressing current workforce issues. There is one registered podiatrist for every 11,762 New Zealanders. In Australia and the UK, the number of podiatrists per capita is around 1 to 5,000. One consequence of having half the number of podiatrists per head of population compared to the UK and Australia, is that the New Zealand amputation rate for people with foot-related diseases, particularly diabetes is over 70% higher than in Australia.

PodiatryNZ has made representations to MIBIE and Health WorkforceNZ to have Podiatry placed on the skills shortage list. This means qualified podiatrists will be able to enter New Zealand without having to first be sponsored by an existing employer. There is a very positive effect of Podiatry been on the skills shortage list. With more podiatrists, there is more awareness and exposure. This raises the profile of podiatry in New Zealand and will grow the profession and client lists.

The Workforce Innovation Fund

PodiatryNZ seeks support for better funded training and development for podiatrists. In conjunction with Northland, Counties Manakau, Waitemata and Auckland DHB's along with the Podiatrists Registration Board, AUT and National Hauroa Coalition (PHO), we supported a 'Registration of Interest' to the Ministry of Health's Workforce NZ for funding to commence a graduate training mentorship. If successful, recent graduates will be engaged in high risk foot training throughout the northern region DHB's with strong links to primary care podiatry. Through a structured internship graduates will be fast-tracked to build much needed 'top of scope' capabilities in the area of high-risk foot. A key focus will be the delivery of services too hard to reach and vulnerable communities.

Legislation Review

The Health Practitioners Competence Assurance Act which governs all health practitioners is under review. Our PodiatryNZ submission advocates for registration boards to be more equitably funded (Nurses pay only \$110 for an annual practicing certificate, podiatrists pay \$992). This could be achieved through a process of back office amalgamations along with the implementation of quality reviews to ensure that all registration boards adopt best practice and continuous improvement.

Advocacy & Relationships Continued

The Podiatrist Registration Board New Zealand

The Podiatrists Registration Board of New Zealand is the regulatory authority for the occupation of podiatry. Their primary aim is to protect public interest by ensuring podiatrists are safe and competent. The Registration Board sets minimum standards for the education programmes conducted by Universities and the Continuing Professional Development (CPD) Recertification Framework. PodiatryNZ has a positive working relationship with the Podiatrist's Registration Board and we look forward to continuing to collaborate on the issues facing the profession.

ACC

On the 1st July 2017, ACC introduced the orthotics contract. PodiatryNZ had input at the 11th hour which saw a record number of podiatrists registering to take on new contracts. Since its introduction, there have been regular communications with various departments at ACC. PodiatryNZ has consistently highlighted the need for good, open communication and for both parties to work towards a common goal of a sustainable contract. PodiatryNZ has achieved some significant successes in building the relationship with ACC.

- 1. PodiatryNZ organised a meeting with ACC representatives in Auckland (AUT) to demonstrate the scope, skills, knowledge and role of a podiatrist.
- 2. The inclusion of ACC at the Sports Practical training held in Christchurch. This provided attendees with the opportunity to learn about causal link, appropriate history taking and other important skills vital to practicing with a contract.
- 3. ACC attended conference, where they held a speaking slot, exhibition stand and conducted private and confidential meetings with contract holders.

While these are just three highlights, it is the constant open communication by the secretariat and Board members that sees the builds the relationship. PodiatryNZ is committed to maintaining a positive and productive dialogue with ACC for the benefit of ACC clients and our members

Allied Health Aotearoa New Zealand

Membership and Advocacy

Through PodiatryNZ's membership with Allied Health Aotearoa New Zealand (AHANZ), we are able to be represented with a collective voice on allied health issues. Allied Health Aotearoa New Zealand (AHANZ), promotes the value of allied health professional services; makes representations and submissions on issues of common interest, develops effective working relationships with government and other key stakeholders. It takes an active approach and is involved in the development, implementation and monitoring of relevant health policies.

Over the past year, Allied Health has effectively advocated for allied health professionals including podiatrists to be at the forefront of the health model. It continues to advocate for a health model that will positively impact the health of all New Zealanders by focusing on intervention and prevention in primary care.

The Federation of Primary Care

A recent initiative has been the formation of the Federation of Primary Care under the Chair of Dame Annette King. The Federation is a membership organisation of multiprofessional and multi-agency primary health bodies. The aim is to work together to provide national leadership on key issues affecting primary health in New Zealand. PodiatryNZ chief executive has been a contributing member of the foundation board. Being on the inside of this development is helping us build effective communications with a range of organisations (particularly PHO's).

The Federation's Vision Statement is "Healthy Aotearoa. Great Primary Health Care".

AUT – Auckland University Technology

Our relationship with AUT deepens. Angela Brenton-Rule, head of the Podiatry School is now a member of the PodiatryNZ Board. We have furthered our dialogue with students which resulted in a record number attending conference and joining PodiatryNZ on graduation. PodiatryNZ has supported the introduction of post graduate papers in podiatry and look forward to their introduction early 2019.

Governance

The PodiatryNZ Board provides leadership to ensure the association sets and achieves strategic objectives while operating effectively and efficiently. The Board works within the governance framework and establishes functions, responsibilities, powers and procedures as required by the incorporated Societies Act.

The board allows for up to seven board members. Three elected, two appointed and two co-opted.

Rules

The PodiatryNZ Rules provide for a governing body consisting of seven Board members:

- Three Members elected as Board members by the Members who are appointed for a two year term and have a continuing right of re-election.
- One Podiatrist Māori representative. A Māori representative body (recognised by the Board), shall determine their processes for selecting their representative.
- One student representative. A student representative body (recognised by the Board), shall determine their processes for selecting their representative.
- Up to two persons that are not be current members, may be co-opted by the Board for a defined period to bring a particular aptitude to the Board.

The Board at the first meeting following the election of Board members elects the PodiatryNZ Chairperson.

Operational Structure

Butler Pelvin & Associates provides secretariat, governance and executive services to PodiatryNZ and is responsible for management of the Associations' activities.

Main Methods Used by the Association to Raise Funds

PodiatryNZ is supported by Registered Podiatrists who pay annual member subscription. PodiatryNZ also relies on the financial support of our Sponsors. Fees to attend PodiatryNZ's activities, such as the biannual conference, are calculated to adequately cover the cost of activity.

Associations' Reliance on Volunteers and Donated Goods or Service

PodiatryNZ is entirely reliant on the goodwill and generous volunteer support of its members. The Association does not utilise donated goods and does not use free or subsidised podiatric services of its members.

INDEPENDENT AUDITORS REPORT

To the Members of Podiatry New Zealand Incorporated

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Podiatry New Zealand Incorporated on pages 6 to 15, which comprise the balance sheet as at 30 June 2018, and the statements of profit or loss and changes in equity for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements are prepared, in all material respects, in accordance with the accounting policies stated in Note 1a.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (New Zealand) (ISAs (NZ)). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditors Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of Podiatry New Zealand Incorporated in accordance with Professional and Ethical Standard 1 (Revised) Code of Ethics for Assurance Practitioners issued by the New Zealand Auditing and Assurance Standards Board, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Other than in our capacity as auditor we have no relationship with, or interests in, Podiatry New Zealand Incorporated.

Emphasis of Matter Basis of Accounting

We draw attention to Note 1a to the financial statements, which describes the basis of accounting. The financial statements have been prepared for the members of the organisation, internal management and Inland Revenue purposes. As a result, the financial statements may not be suitable for another purpose.

Restriction on Responsibility

This report is made solely to the Members, as a body. Our audit work has been undertaken so that we might state to the Members those matters we are required to state to them in an auditor's report and for no other purpose. To the fullest extent permitted by law, we do not accept or assume responsibility to anyone other than the Members as a body, for our audit work, for this report, or for the opinions we have formed.

Board Responsibility for the Financial Statements

The Board are responsible on behalf of the entity for determining that the Special Purpose framework adopted is acceptable in Podiatry New Zealand Incorporated's circumstances, the preparation of financial statements, and for such internal control as the Board determine is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, the Board are responsible on behalf of the entity for assessing the entity's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the Board either intend to liquidate the entity or to cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so.





Auditors Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditors report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISAs (NZ) will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

Notes to the Financial Statements

1. General information

PodiatryNZ is a not for profit organisation registered under the Incorporated Societies Act 1908 and dedicated to enhancing the profession of podiatry and increasing awareness among New Zealanders about the importance of good foot health care.

These financial statements were adopted by the PodiatryNZ Board by email resolution on the 28 September 2018.

a. Statement of compliance and basis of preparation

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Special Purpose Framework using generally accepted accounts principles and have been prepared for the members of the organization, internal management purposes and Inland Revenue.

b. Changes in accounting policies

There have been no changes to accounting policies in the year. All policies have been on a consistent basis with previous years.

c. Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with financial institutions with original maturities of three months or less that are readily converted to cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value. Cash on deposit with financial institutions with maturities greater than three months is classified as cash on deposit within the statement of financial position.

These financial statements must be read in conjunction with the attached Notes to the Accounts and Audit Report.



d. Goods and services tax

The financial report has been prepared on a goods and services tax exclusive basis, with the exception of accounts receivable and accounts payable which are stated as gst inclusive.

e. Interest received

Interest received is recognised on a time-proportion basis using the effective interest method. The interest rate risk is managed by investing funds in deposits in a registered bank.

f. <u>Taxation</u>

The organisation's subscription revenue from members is tax exempt in accordance with the Income Tax Act 2007. As an incorporated society, the organisation receives a \$1,000 tax exemption. Any revenue other than this is taxable.

g. Revenue recognition

Subscription revenue received for the following financial year is recognised as revenue in advance.

Revenue from conferences and other activities and events is recognised in the Statement of Financial Performance only on completion of the conference, activity or event. Expenditure relating directly to such activities and events is also not recognised in the Statement of Financial Performance until completion of the activity or event.

Interest received is recognised in the Statement of Financial Performance as the gross amount of interest received in cash or added to deposit principal.

h. Trade receivables

Trade receivables are valued at net realisable value. Trade receivables exclude the unpaid membership fees not received, which were written off in the Statement of Financial Performance by 30 June or else are recorded under the provision for doubtful debts when this assessment is made after 30 June.

i. Charitable donation

The association through administrative arrangements with Podiatry NZ Charitable Trust (PNZCT) financially supports education and research of podiatry in New Zealand. This donation is determined on specific activities managed by PodiatryNZ (refer Note 3c).

j. Management of capital

The association's capital mainly consists of cash or cash equivalents. PodiatryNZ Management and PodiatryNZ Board monitor its capital funding needs on a regular basis.



2. Income Tax

Tax is not chargeable on the net surplus earned by the Association within the 'circle of membership'. Income Tax is due on all other revenue including interest received during the year, less the \$1,000 deduction allowed by Inland Revenue.

The permanent adjustment has been included to reflect the movement in the taxable income after removing the membership subscription revenue and the attributed expenses.

There are tax losses to be carried forward and to be offset against future taxable income. The availability of tax losses is subject to the requirements of the Income Tax Act 2007 continuing to be met. The potential future income tax benefit has not been recorded in the accounts.

3. Other significant Items

3a. Biannual Conference

Registration fees and preparatory costs of the Auckland PodiatryNZ 2018 conference were respectively treated as revenue and expenditure at the conclusion date on 30 June 2018.

The PodiatryNZ Secretariat has co-ordinated the 28 to 30 June 2018 Auckland conference and activity is reflected in amounts shown in the Statement of Financial Position:

The current liability, Conference revenue in advance (2018:\$nil 2017: \$3,999) represents participant registration fees, which subsequent to balance date will be treated as revenue when the conference activity is delivered.



• The current asset, Conference expenses in advance (2018:\$nil 2017: \$23,748) represent costs incurred in arranging the conference, which subsequent to balance date will be expensed when the conference activity is delivered.

3b. Members Insurance Scheme

PodiatryNZ collect BizCover insurance premiums for the group professional indemnity insurance scheme required to be paid under PodiatryNZ rules by all members individually that provide podiatric services to the public.

3c. PodiatryNZ Charitable Trust

The Podiatry NZ Charitable Trust has objects to promote education and research of podiatry in New Zealand and is financially supported by this Association.

Podiatry NZ has administrative control of the Podiatry NZ Charitable Trust with Podiatry NZ Board members acting as trustees for this charitable trust. On 29 July 2017, the Podiatry NZ Board's reconfirmed its assessment that administrative costs of keeping the trust operational far outweighed the benefits of having charitable status and decided to wind down the Trust as at 30 June 2018:

Secretariat

Butler Pelvin & Associates provides a secretariat service under service agreement. That is the provision of office premises, staff, computers, communications, website, membership management systems and other incidental expenses including policy and strategic advice by Jennifer Pelvin who acts in a chief executive capacity.

From time to time the PodiatryNZ Board review the work programme and prioritise activities, which are by nature project based and separately resourced. All work is undertaken on a "high trust" basis with the PodiatryNZ Board providing oversight of strategies and service delivery.

Butler Pelvin & Associates organised and managed a trade show held in conjunction with the July 2016 Wellington "Patient Journey" Conference and as contracted has paid PodiatryNZ (2018:\$nil 2017: \$39,000) sponsorship for the conference. For the PodiatryNZ 2018 Conference, the PodiatryNZ Board organised the Auckland 2018 Trade Exhibition and Butler Pelvin & Associates managed this on behalf of PodiatryNZ.

PodiatryNZ Board Members

From time to time PodiatryNZ Board members contribute to PodiatryNZ by undertaking assignments relating to their area of expertise. Where appropriate contributions are assessed and payments are made to the PodiatryNZ Board members at the rate of \$70 per hour. For the 30 June years, 2018 and 2017, there have been no payments to Board members.

PodiatryNZ Board members are reimbursed for incidental expenses incurred in attending PodiatryNZ engagements. Incidental reimbursements for the secretariat and PodiatryNZ Board members are not identified separately as they form part of the normal operating expenses.

7. Contingent liabilities

PodiatryNZ has no contingent liabilities at 30 June 2018 (2017: \$nil).

8. Events after balance

There have been no events subsequent to balance date that impact PodiatryNZ financial statements at 30 June 2018 (2017: \$nil).
